In instructing on what serves as evidence of "unable to control" oneself, BURRIS appears to have identified conation (striving and purpose, and cognition (all forms of knowing and awareness)).

*Commentary on the DMH Clinical Evaluator Handbook.* Describes and addresses various misrepresentations contained in the Handbook about how to understand the diagnostic criteria for the "diagnosed mental disorder"

defined and described in Welfare & Institutions Code Section 6600 et seq., and its instructions to mental health evaluators for them to substitute DSM-IV-TR diagnostic categories and criteria in their stead.

*Comments on Mental Health Issues Raised by the BURRIS Decision* of the California State Court of Appeal, 4th District, Division Two. *DAUBERT MAY NOT BE LAW IN CALIFORNIA BUT IT IS SCIENCE EVERYWHERE.* Addresses how the DAUBERT ruling reflects the mandates of science; i.e., objectivity, hence, describes what is required for information to pass muster as "generally accepted in the relevant scientific community."
